4.	Project Update August 2022 Sentient Report	The August monthly report was reviewed at a high level with the group, noting a lot of info has been superceded as we are now at end of Sept. Key points discussed: The programme remains at Amber, due to concerns relating to the availability of a device to meet the legislation. Potential to shift to RED in Sept once the outcome of device testing is completed. Initial shortlisted OFT devices completed independent laboratory testing, with no device meeting the verification criteria as set out in the Standard. Subsequent testing of longlisted devices identified two that do meet verification criteria. These are now progressing to 1 day operational trial scenario on 13 Oct. Two of the initial devices that failed verification testing are being re-tested and will also take part in the trial if they successfully pass the laboratory re-testing. Options were developed, in parallel to testing, based on an outcome of not having a device with the technological capability that meets the legislation and provided as part of Board pack. It has been confirmed that based on current device capability and the NZ specific legislation that devices will only be able to test for THC and Cocaine at the roadside. Other drugs which are desirable to be tested for, cannot currently be tested for with surety, due in part to drug families' and resulting unclear identification. Cocaine (in NZ) is currently only represented in a very small percentage of incidents, whereas THC does factor in a much higher percentage. However, THC could be difficult to prosecute for with reliability, which is further complicated with medicinal THC prescriptions becoming more common. This leaves more prevalent high impairment/impact drugs (in NZ) unable to be currently tested for at the roadside. Current market devices also only detect presence not levels. Lack of device capability in the market therefore limits Police's ability to implement the intention of the legislation. Based on now confirmed facts, Meeting attendees agreed the need to engage with our i

Governance Board Procurement Update_For Noting	unwell etc. Due diligence underway of potential OFT devices has identified that only THC and Cocaine are able to be tested for roadside with current market devices available. The impact of the device technology only allowing for the testing of THC (the psycho-active ingredient in cannabis) and cocaine falls short of detection of the most prevalent drugs and has the ability to undermine the intent of the Act in reducing the number of deaths on the road whilst also impacting on the level of trust and confidence in NZP. It is recognised due diligence is required, \$\frac{\$9(2)(1)}{2}\$ validating the accuracy of the device to enable both public and other stakeholders and to build trust and confidence in both the device and process. The Board Noted the following points A-E: Note the contents of Procurement Update memorandum. Note based on current understanding that current device technology doesn't allow for operationalisation of a random roadside drug test as the amended Act intended. Note based on current understanding that the limitation of which drugs can be effectively tested for at the roadside using available technology, is limited to THC and cocaine. Note that though the technology is capable of testing for THC, there are difficulties when presented with a positive result for presence of THC due to prescription medication and in relation to 'recent use'.

6.	Indicative Impact on Non-OFT Blood Fees – For Noting	Update provided on ESR testing fee schedule costs and contract variation for Schedule 5. Costs will be substantially more to include different testing scenarios, upwards of \$1550. Based on current test numbers this represents a potentially significant BAU costs increase, which were not part of/included in OFT budget. Contract variation is being submitted to Safe Roads Control Action Group (SRCAG) in October. Fee increases/additions will be a variation to the current ESR contract, with both existing contract and new part to be renewed together as current ESR contract was also coming up for renewal. Noted
7.	Gender and Ethnicity_For Approval	It is currently voluntary and not a legal requirement, for ethnicity and/or gender information to be provided to NZP. As such, it is recommendation that NZP do not attempt to capture ethnicity or gender at this point in time. Meeting attendees agreed with recommended approach.
