Request for information

Thank you for your Official Information Act 1982 (OIA) request dated 16 April 2024. You asked:

- 1. List of the top 10 most stolen motorcycle models in New Zealand in 2023.
- 2. Number of theft incidents reported for each motorcycle model.

The table below shows the top 10 most frequently stolen motorcycles make and models in the 2023 calendar year as recorded by Police. The data includes all vehicle types that are recorded as motorcycles or motorbikes, but not dirt bikes, farm bikes, motocross bikes, quad bikes, or mopeds. The last column shows how many of these have been recovered as at 16 April 2024.

As you may remember from the previous response you received, there are a lot of variations in models of motorcycles, each can be recorded slightly differently, which changes the top 10 calculations. As there are so many variations in mostly letters and numbers, it is difficult to determine what constitutes a similar model. Therefore, a second table of just top 10 stolen motorcycle makes is provided.
