## Notes:

The above table contains provisional data which is drawn from a dynamic operational database. This is subject to change as new information is recorded or recoded.

An infringement notice is issued for a minor traffic offence. Each infringement has a specified set fee. The data provided includes all recorded infringements regardless of the outcome, such as fee paid, waived or referred to the Ministry of Justice for an unpaid fee.

The traffic offence 'driving without appropriate driver licence' is also used to record situations where a person holds the incorrect licence type for the vehicle they are driving, for example where a person holds a car licence but is riding a motorcycle. Police records do not distinguish between the two types of offending. This offence can be dealt with by way of a traffic infringement, or a court proceeding.

Police cannot provide information on the number of people offered compliance, which would require individual review of every file. However, Police can provide the number of unlicensed driver offences that were waived under the compliance scheme after drivers successfully completed compliance.

Please note that the data does not report the number of people charged or issued an infringement notice, regardless of whether an offence was waived or resulted in another outcome. However, Police can report on the number of traffic offences dealt with by way of infringement notices and court proceedings.
