# Message from the White Ribbon Campaign

Violence is endemic within New Zealand with one in three women experiencing violence from a partner in their lifetime, while on average, fourteen women are killed each year by a member of their own family.

Help White Ribbon to create change by taking The Pledge to never commit, condone or remain silent about violence towards women.

Men want to be proud fathers, uncles, grandfathers and great husbands/partners. We want our partners and kids to live in safe homes without violence. Taking The Pledge to never commit, condone or remain silent about violence towards women means a better life for you and those close to you

White Ribbon is an international movement that condemns men's violence towards women. Each November, White Ribbon runs a month-long campaign that culminates on 25 November, White Ribbon Day. Last year saw a focus on non-physical violence and generating conversations about men as positive role models.

This year we are asking men to take 'The Pledge'. Judge Peter Boshier, Chair of the White Ribbon Campaign and one of our White Ribbon Ambassadors, rightly identifies that "while most men are not violent, most violence against women is perpetrated by men". This is why The Pledge is so important. It is a call to action for New Zealand men to take ownership of men's violence towards women, and to actively be part of the solution. It can be taken both online or in person at many of the community events that occur throughout New Zealand during November.

"The time for looking away is over. I'm promoting this pledge because if we all take responsibility for this serious problem, we can change both attitudes and behaviour. For too long I've seen the results of family violence in the courts, for our mothers, our daughters, our colleagues, our friends and our partners – we need to take a stand and it starts with The Pledge." # Tournament History

The New Zealand Communities Football Cup (NZCFC) is the national tournament for the regional winners of community football events held over the past 12 months. Although regional football events have been held by local councils and ethnic organisations for some years, the NZCFC offers the opportunity for regional winner's community-based teams to compete against one another at a national level. This tournament is the culmination of more than 1000 games of football.



The New Zealand Police owned event was established to contribute practically towards our vision of 'Safer Communities Together', provide an opportunity for positive interaction amongst communities and a desire to use football to help drive positive social change. The NZCFC supports the White Ribbon campaign where men from all communities pledge to never commit, condone or remain silent against violence against women.

The tournament has a robust framework to support it including an official tournament logo, website, posters, regional city council support and is endorsed by government agencies. Supporters of the event include the Human Rights Commission, Families Commission, Settling In (Ministry of Social Development), New Zealand Football, New Zealand Federation of Multicultural Councils, Oceania Football, Cuesports and local city councils.

The inaugural NZCFC event was held in 2008 and hosted by Wellington city. It was won by the Upper Hutt based Somalian team. The 2009 tournament was hosted by Palmerston North was won by the local team from Oman. The 2010 tournament was hosted by Christchurch City and won by the local Polish team. The 2011 tournament was hosted by Auckland City and won by the Wellington based Somalian team.

In 2010 a youth forum was added to the tournament. The purpose of the youth forum is to provide local youth an opportunity to have a voice on issues that impact on them. These issues are then collated for addressing by the relevant agencies.

Police have a vision to see the tournament grow and expand in time throughout the Pacific. As with sports such as Rugby where the Police have engaged with teams to raise awareness on issues such as family violence, we would like to utilise football to drive positive social outcomes both within New Zealand and in the Pacific

2. Both Marae and Park are alcohol and smoke free venues.
3. Teams check in starts Friday 2.00pm.
4. Powhiri (official welcoming) for teams will be conducted for the first team on arrival.

6. There will be a mandatory team's manager/captain meeting 8.30am on Saturday at the club room before the opening ceremony - it is important to attend.
7. Most of all, please discourage unfair play, bad language and violent behaviour on and off the field of play at all times.

# **Tournament Rules**

All matches shall be played in accordance with FIFA Laws of the Game. Players' equipment shall be in accordance with the FIFA Laws of the Game. Note that shin guards are compulsory. No player is permitted to play without shin guards. Shin pads/guards shall not be exposed.

All players represented must be on the team list handed in prior to tournament.

## **Points**

3 points will be awarded for a win 1 point for a draw

In the event of a team being on equal points after the group stages, the following, in order will determine final position:

1. Better goal difference
2. Greater number of goals scored
3. Winner of match between respective teams
4. Toss of Coin

## **Substitutes**

Five rolling subs may be used in any one game, at any time, or for any reason. Hence coaches may make unlimited substitutions during a game. A player substituted may participate later in the game if required. All substitutions are to be made from the half-way line.

A squad of 18 players per team is allowed in this tournament.

## **Duration of Matches**

All matches except the final will be of 50 minutes duration (25x2) There will be a 5 minute break between each half.

The Final will be of 50 minutes duration (25x2). There will be a 10 minute break between the half.

All matches played on Sunday Dec 1st that result in a draw will have 10 minutes extra time played then go to a penalty shootout.

Any Protests must be received in writing within 30 minutes after the match

# **Tournament Rules cont.**

## **Misconduct**

During the tournament the following disciplinary penalties will apply:

- Where a player has been sent from the field, they shall be automatically suspended for the next game that their team plays in the tournament.
- Any player who has received two cautions during the tournament shall be automatically suspended for the next game that their team plays in the tournament.

In a tournament where cross-overs apply after group play e.g. a semi-final (unlike a round robin), then all players from all teams shall be deemed to be free of any yellow cards incurred (but not red cards previously incurred) on commencement of post section / group play.

Any protest matters arising during a game must be notified in writing to the Tournament Controller no later than two hours after the match, for the protest to be considered.

A Judicial Committee shall be established, comprising three persons. One of whom will be the Tournament Controller who will be the Chairperson, and the other members shall be selected by the chairperson, providing those chosen are not from teams involved in the matter being investigated. The Judicial Committee shall meet at the conclusion of each day's play where necessary to adjudicate on matters arising that day.

# **Fairplay Policy**

All players, coaches, team officials and supporters must conduct themselves in a sportsmanlike manner. This includes the acceptance of umpires and referees decisions, the avoidance of obscene and abusive language, the acceptance of a team member's performance on the day and the resulting score.

All coaches are responsible for the promotion and role modelling of acceptable behaviour for the entire team, players, officials and supporters.

## **Behaviour Guidelines**

- No inappropriate, foul or abusive language
- Respect of property and belongings of others
- Encouragement of Fair Play
- Respect the performances and achievements of others
- Reliability, punctuality, commitment and honesty of effort

## **Player Code of Conduct**

- Play for enjoyment
- Play hard but fair
- Play by the laws of the game
- Be committed to your team
- Never argue with the referee's/umpires decisions – control your temper
- Work equally hard for yourself and your team
- Be a good sport – applaud, acknowledge all good play whether by your team or by your opponent
- Be a positive role model to peers and whanau

## **Supporters Code of Conduct**

- Acknowledge the performances of both teams
- Be positive with referees
- Acknowledge the efforts of the referees/umpires
- Let the players play their game not yours
- Praise actual efforts not results
- Your role is to set an example for the players
- Don't criticise or put down players, coaches or referees/umpires

## Wakefield Park, Island Bay, Wellington The Parade, Island Bay



Wakefield Park is Wellington's third artificial turf which was laid in 2010. It provides all of "the Bay" players with a true all weather surface to play on throughout the winter.

The park has one of the regions best clubrooms for players and spectators all to come in from the elements and enjoy some South Coast hospitality.



# Accommodation

Teams will be staying at Tapu te Ranga Marae, 44 Rhine Street, Island Bay. Easier access can be gained by driving to end of Danube street, Island Bay and entering from the cul de sac. The marae is smokefree and alcohol free.

Tapu te Ranga Marae is a living Marae and it is shared with people of all races and cultures. It is the world's largest, tallest, fully wooden house on wooden piles – 131 foot high. It is listed as a New Zealand historic and heritage site. It accommodates up to 350 people and was started in 1974 by Bruce Stewart. The Marae is less than a minutes drive from Wakefield grounds or a 5 minute walk.
