Thank you for your request of 23 March 2022, in which you requested the following:

I'm seeking information held by Police in relation to intelligence gathered around the protest activity at Parliament in February and March 2022. This request, made under the Official Information Act, includes communications, reports and briefings which detail:

Particular groups or individuals involved in the protest at Parliament; any planning leading up to the protest activity; information collected on the ground/within the "freedom camp"; information collected online.

Open Source Intelligence provide details of:

How many groups or individuals connected to the protest continue to be monitored by its team - and who those groups or individuals are?

Which online channels and websites are monitored?

How many prosecutions have arisen from intelligence collected from publicly available online sources, and details of those prosecutions?

Any warnings given to individuals arising from intelligence collected from publicly available online sources, and details of the warnings given?

Your request has been considered in accordance with the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA), and I can now provide the following response.

As you may be aware, the Independent Police Conduct Authority (IPCA) has commenced an independent investigation and review (Review) of the policing of the occupation on and around Parliament grounds in Wellington during February and March 2022 (Protest).

Details of the scope of the Review are available on the IPCA's website¹ and you will note this scope includes Police management of intelligence as it related to the Protest, including consideration of the intelligence available to Police, the sufficiency of that intelligence, and how it was assessed and informed decision making prior to and throughout the course of the Protest.

Whilst this Review is underway, information relating to the issues under investigation and review is expected to be the subject of examination by the IPCA under its powers of investigation under

the IPCA Act 1988. With this Review commenced, there is a strong public interest in allowing these matters to be considered in the round by the IPCA.

In the meantime, my response to each of your questions can be found below.

We consider that the following information requested tends to go to the heart of the matters that are under investigation and review by the IPCA:

any planning leading up to the protest activity; information collected on the ground/within the "freedom camp"; information collected online.

Where such information is available, it is withheld in reliance upon section 9(2)(ba)(ii) of the OIA. It is in the public interest for the Review to be completed without earlier predetermination of the matters it is considering.

We envisage relevant information will be released following the conclusion of the IPCA's Review.

How many groups or individuals connected to the protest continue to be monitored by its team - and who those groups or individuals are?

Three important Police functions are to maintain public safety, identify opportunities to prevent crime and to provide the community support and reassurance. To do so, Police need to receive information from the community and undertake investigations, with the majority of that work completed outside the public view.

In the case of the occupation at Parliament grounds, Police will continue to receive information from the community that might be helpful to prevent further offending or to identify those who committed crimes during that period. It is not in the interest of communities for details of groups or individuals Police may have an interest in, to be released publicly, as this would alert those people and cause them to change how they operate.

This part of your request is therefore refused under the following grounds:

- section 6(c) of the OIA, as making the information available would be likely to prejudice the maintenance of the law, including the prevention, investigation, and detection of offences
- section 9(2)(a) of the OIA, to protect the privacy of natural persons.

Where information is withheld under section 9, Police considers the public interest in release of this information is not outweighed by the grounds for withholding that information.

Which online channels and websites are monitored?

Police receive information from a wide range of sources including directly from the community and through monitoring publicly available social media sites. For similar reasons supplied in response to the previous question, it is not in the public interest to detail how or where Police undertake this work as this would result in suspects changing how they operate.

This part of your request is therefore refused under section 6(c) of the OIA, as making the information available would be likely to prejudice the maintenance of the law, including the prevention, investigation, and detection of offences.

How many prosecutions have arisen from intelligence collected from publicly available online sources, and details of those prosecutions?

Any warnings given to individuals arising from intelligence collected from publicly available online sources, and details of the warnings given?

Links between intelligence information or activity and related warnings or prosecutions are not captured in our databases in a retrievable format. Provision of this information would require the identification and manual review of each individual file. As such, this part of your request is refused under section 18(f) of the OIA, as the information requested cannot be made available without substantial collation or research. We invite you to consider whether you wish to refine

your request. However, as any such information may also tend to go to the heart of the matters under investigation and review by the IPCA, the considerations above would likely apply.

The IPCA anticipates the Review will be completed and reported on by 31 March 2023. Police recognise the importance of transparency in these matters and look forward to the release of the IPCA's report, at which time more detailed information regarding the Police response to the Protest is likely to be publicly available.

Please note that as part of its commitment to openness and transparency, Police proactively release some information and documents that may be of interest to the public. An anonymised version of this response may be publicly released on the New Zealand Police website.

With this Review commenced, there is a strong public interest in allowing these matters to be considered in the round by the IPCA.

Police are undertaking a criminal investigation into activity that occurred at the Protest. Prosecution decisions are made in accordance with the Solicitor-General's Prosecution Guidelines. Issues of reparation may or may not be relevant to specific offences, however this would be a matter to be determined during the court proceedings on a case-by-case basis. Therefore, this part of your request is refused pursuant to section 18(e) of the OIA as the information requested does not exist.

Thank you for your request of 4 May 2022, in which you requested the following:

On Wednesday the 3rd May 2022 it was reported that both Winston Peters and Matt King have been trespassed from Parliament. It was also reported this trespass notice was filed by Trevor Mallard. Jacinda Ardern has stated publically that she has been informed by Trevor Mallard that the trespass notice was in fact filed by a Government Security Agency.

Please tell me the name of the person who completed the trespass notice against Winston Peters and Matt King.

Please tell me the name of the person who lodged the trespass notice against Winston Peters and Matt King.

If the name cannot be released please tell me the job title / position description of the person who lodged / completed aforementioned trespass notices.

I am requesting this information to be sure that current Trespass Notice and other legislation surrounding trespass is not being misused.

Your request has been considered in accordance with the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA), and I can now provide the following response.

I note that the decisions to trespass Right Hon Winston Peters and Matt King were made by Parliament's security team, which is part of Parliamentary Services. Request for information

Thank you for your request of 10 April 2022, in which you requested the following:

I would like to request all communications between any representative of the New Zealand Police and any member of any Canadian law enforcement service over the period 06/02/2022 and 03/03/2022. To avoid clarification, and to further narrow this request, I am interested in any information in reference to the "CONVOY 2022 NZ" protest and the Canadian Truckers protest

Your request has been considered in accordance with the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA), and I can now provide the following response.

As you may be aware, the Independent Police Conduct Authority (IPCA) has commenced an independent investigation and review (Review) of the policing of the occupation on and around Parliament grounds in Wellington during February and March 2022 (Protest).

Details of the scope of the Review are available on the IPCA's website¹ and you will note this scope includes Police planning and preparation, operational execution, and management of intelligence.

Whilst this Review is underway, information relating to the issues under investigation and review is expected to be the subject of examination by the IPCA under its powers of investigation under the IPCA Act 1988. With this Review commenced, there is a strong public interest in allowing these matters to be considered in the round by the IPCA.

We consider that the information requested tends to go to the heart of the matters that are under investigation and review by the IPCA. Where such information is available, it is withheld in reliance upon section 9(2)(ba)(ii) of the OIA. It is in the public interest for the Review to be completed without earlier predetermination of the matters it is considering.

We envisage relevant information will be released following the conclusion of the IPCA's Review.

The IPCA anticipates the Review will be completed and reported on by 31 March 2023. Police recognises the importance of transparency in these matters and looks forward to the release of the IPCA's report, at which time more detailed information regarding the Police response to the Protest will likely be publicly available.
